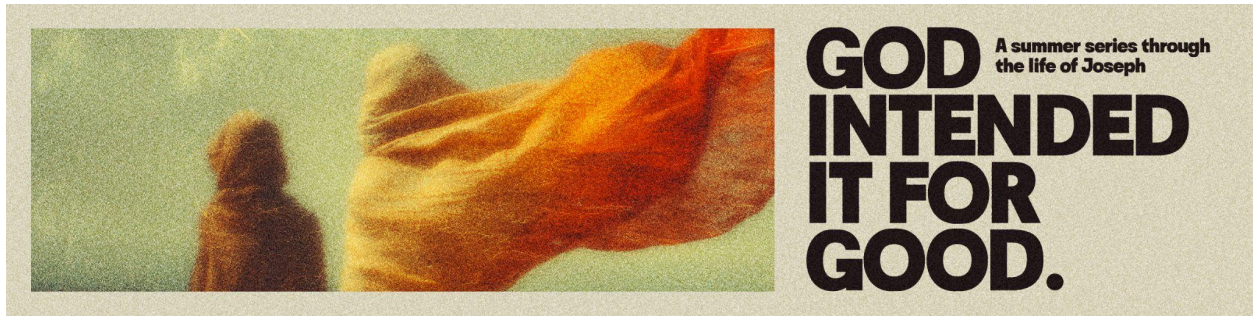




Week #5: When Past and Present Collide

- Face the truth and take ownership.
